ADVENT – What is it all about?

I don't know about you, but when I was a child I couldn't wait for my 'chocolate' Advent calendar, which meant that every morning the first thing that I felt I just had to do was to run down the stairs and open up that day's Advent window – I would look frantically around the Advent calendar trying to find the one I was after for that day, and then I would tuck into the small piece of chocolate that was waiting for me! But what are Advent calendars for, what is 'Advent' all about?

Well, most people I spoke to stated that their children use Advent Calendars as a count down for Christmas, or for New Year if you buy the ones that go up to New Year! What about you, what does Advent mean to you?

Well, the word advent means 'coming' or 'arrival' and, for Christians, Advent is a time of waiting, a time to prepare to celebrate, as Christmas approaches when we celebrate the birth of Jesus and await his return. It is the season in which the church celebrates waiting as an essential part of human experience – it is much more than the countdown to Christmas or the season of shopping; as in nature, it's a time of growth and transformation.

Our Diocese (Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire) is looking to celebrate Advent this year with an Advent challenge called 'Living God's Love', where people are invited to sign up to pray and reflect as we prepare in Advent. You are also invited to take up this challenge by signing up for daily text or emails, or to take a weekly sheet from one of our churches which will show the bible verses for each day. These verses follow an Advent theme, and offer an opportunity for us to pause, reflect, pray and to think especially about the connections that make up our lives. LITTLE MUNDEN SCHOOL

I always seem to open my articles for the Parish magazine lamenting the quick passage of time and again we appear to have reached the ½ term holiday in a flash. I now need to write an update of all that has taken place since June, which may take some time!

In July we said a sad goodbye to Mrs Warman after 24 years at Little Munden. We held a garden party attended by staff, pupils, parents, past colleagues, friends, past pupils and a photographer from the Hertfordshire Mercury. The weather held, cakes, scones and nibbles were devoured; the children enjoyed bouncy castles and a treasure hunt while Mrs Warman was inundated with gifts and good wishes and a plea to be on hand for advice! Thank you to all those people who baked cakes (Rachel Coles and Sarah Meadows) and the numerous volunteers, including pupils from Chauncy who prepared scones, hid treasure and generally helped out. Mrs Warman and Mrs Wells, our Nursery Nurse, who also hung up her wellies and painting overall, very generously gave the school a sand and water tray for the younger children to enjoy.

Miss Spiers also moved on, but rather than retiring, she accepted a post in the Turks and Caicos Islands where she can now be found in a Year 1 class or on the beach photographing blue skies and azure waters. She too was touched by the generosity of all those who contributed to her leaving gifts.

We also received the very generous gift of a photograph printer from the Linton family. We wish Elizabeth every success in her new school in Welwyn and would also like to thank Steve Linton for all of his input over the years as a governor. Mr Martin Spackman also resigned from the governing body as his children moved on to new schools and we would like to think him too for his hard work and support during his time as a governor.

With these departures, inevitably come new recruits and we are delighted to welcome on to our team, Miss Lizzy Franks, who is teaching the Year 5 and 6 children and Mrs Jennifer Penney, who is teaching Years 1 and 2. Both ladies have settled in well and the children are continuing to thrive in their care. Miss Easton has stepped in to Class 1 and Mr Woolhouse continues in Class 3.

We also welcome Mrs Jane Mulcahy, Mr Jonathan Pool and Mrs Carole Bennett on to the governing body.

Again, over the summer holidays, further improvements have been made to the structure of the school. Research and suggestions from the school council revealed that the children felt the toilets needed to be improved, so we embarked on a project to do just this. All the toilets now have more suitable flooring; they have been redecorated and the wooden 'walls' have been replaced with more vibrant and attractive partitions.

Other works included enclosing the resources area to make it a useful working space, constructing a resources cupboard for the teachers and updating all the ICT networks.

You may also remember that one of our school governors, Douglas Neuff, died last year, and his family very generously donated the collection from his memorial service to the school. In total, we received over £1600. This money has been used to create a teaching room in a previously open plan area, which has been kitted out with a computer and specific programs to support the learning for children with educational needs.

All of these improvements have already had a huge impact on learning across the school.

12 children started school in Reception this September. Many of them have siblings already at the school and it is wonderful to welcome so many that we have seen growing up. We also welcome 4 new families to the school and hope that they all enjoy many happy years with us.

As always, at the beginning of the school year, we re-elect our school council. The new team is already well established and is full of ideas about things we can do to improve our school. The first event is happening during ½ term, on Wednesday 27th October, when there will hopefully be a team of willing volunteers working in our Millennium Garden between 9.30am and 12.30pm, to spruce it up and make it a safe and attractive place for the children to play or sit quietly.

The school has also been buzzing with our new creative curriculum which we have been working on in conjunction with 3 other schools- Benington, Thundridge and Graveley. The staff are working together across the four schools to plan, share resources and ideas and to broaden the curriculum for all the children. We have seen some amazing projects focussing on Rainforests, Shakespeare, Holidays and Ourselves.

On 30th September we celebrated our Harvest festival, this year very ably led by Mrs Caroline Franks while Reverend Payne is on sabbatical. We collected gifts which the children from Year 6 then delivered to nominated people around the village. The thank you letters we have received are greatly appreciated and a lovely example for us to share with the children. Another thank you to the parents who helped with transport and to Mrs Wells who returned and volunteered her services as a driver.

We have a number of activities, visits and events planned for this term, based around our topics. The younger children have just come back from an exhausting trip to Woburn Safari Park where they had opportunities to explore and extend their learning in different ways. The general consensus was that it was 'brilliant' and I have been hearing all about elephants, squirrel monkeys and giraffes and what they get up to! It's amazing to think that in just a couple of weeks we will be starting preparations for Christmas- singing carols, making decorations and cakes and planning for our nativity and Santa's visit.

My final paragraph is dedicated to Mrs Jean Darling, who, after almost 30 years, has decided it is time to retire. Many children from the village over the years will have worked with Mrs Darling doing spellings, workshops, maths groups, reading..... many of those children now being adults themselves and some of them with their own children at Little Munden. Mrs Darling has helped and supported pupils, staff, parents and at least 7 head teachers. She has helped in the kitchen, in the classroom, in the office and in the swimming pool. She even has her own 'Jean's area' where children go to get reading books and some extra support. Her knowledge, initiative and expertise will be sorely missed as will her willingness to step in to the breach in an emergency. After so many years, Jean certainly deserves some time to relax and enjoy life, but Little Munden school will not quite be the same place without her. I know all the staff, pupils and parents would join me in wishing Jean all the best for a long and happy retirement.

LITTLE MUNDEN PARISH COUNCIL

At the September council meeting amongst the items discussed were the following:

Litter Picker. After several years of diligent service Mathew Ovens has had to resign this part time post, we are all grateful to him for his conscientious and hard work keeping our village clear of litter. Alex Bartel's has been taken on as our new litter picker.

Tree Problems. We have had many complaints from residents in Whiteley Close and Windy Rise about the growth of tree's on narrow verges getting out of hand. We have therefore instructed the Parishes maintenance contractors to cut these trees down and grind out the stumps, work to be done as soon as leaves have fallen. We have arranged for the logs to be left adjacent to felling area for any parishioners with log burning stoves to take away for fire wood. Although the planting of tree's is an admirable thing to do, past planting of unsuitable varieties on narrow grass verges is now creating a problem for us. Please note that the very large Oak Tree in Whitely Close cannot be removed.

On Street Car Parking. There has been some concern on the level of car parking in Founcely Ave, it is requested that those with car parking at the back of their properties and garages could perhaps bring these area's into use as some residents don't have parking space outside their own properties. Could we also point

out that it is illegal to park un-taxed & un-insured vehicles on the highway.

Dog Fouling. The problem of repeated fouling on The Baulk footpath (FP1) to Three Corners Wood (FP14) is starting to improved, however not quickly enough.

When walking your please take dog dirt bags with you, clear up after your dog has defecated and place in either of the dog dirt bins or litter bins provided. To repeat myself, chucking it in its bag into the nearest hedgerow is candidly not acceptable.

Linda Last, the Dog Control officer for East Herts Council will be adding this path to her regular patrol area. If you see someone not clearing up after their dog they can be reported to *East Herts Environmental Service Team @ 01279 655361* ('e-mail' operations.admin@eastherts.gov.uk)

East Herts Development Strategy Options

A very important document was included with the September issue of LINK – the core strategy consultation leaflet on “Where would you put 8,500 homes and supporting infrastructure in East Herts by 2031?” The District Council has formulated 6 options (they will listen to others anyone may want to put forward), being:

- A. Towns (Hertford, Ware, Sawbridgeworth, Bishop’s Stortford, Buntingford) – concentrate all development in the 5 towns.
- B. Towns and larger service villages - distribute development to 9 larger service villages as well as the 5 towns.
- C. Towns, larger service villages and 16 smaller service villages (including DANE END) – distribute development to towns and villages with existing facilities.
- D. Towns, larger service villages, smaller service villages (including DANE END) and other villages/hamlets – distribute development throughout all settlements of whatever size and function.
- E. Towns, Stevenage and Welwyn Garden City – concentrate development in the 5 towns and urban extensions east of Stevenage and Welwyn Garden City.
- F. Settlements with transport corridors (not including DANE END) – distribute development to transport corridors defined by rail, road and bus routes.

Before we become too *nimbyish*, we should recognise the importance of maintaining our existing village facilities – churches, school, shop/post office, pub, bus services, village hall – the viability of which are hugely important to our community. Church attendances are at all-time lows, pupil numbers at the primary school

have fallen this year and are predicted to decline over the next few years, there is a commitment to the shop, but Pete and Bev would clearly have a more sustainable business with more custom and, whilst we hope the scare is over, the future of The Boot has been under serious threat over recent years. And whilst we may complain about the timetable, the existing bus services are under-utilised. All of which suggests that we should not hurriedly reject some development in Dane End, which could be beneficial in bringing more families with children to our village.

Put into context, there are 53,000 dwellings in East Herts, 370 in Dane End. If Dane End permitted proportionate development within its aim of making sure that any changes fit in with the existing character of the area, acceptance of either of Options C or D could result in around 60 new dwellings over the 20 year period – an average of 3 a year. This stage of the consultation process is not concerned with detailed policy issues, e.g. design and amenity or the allocation of specific sites for development; as the district council fine-tunes its plans over subsequent stages, everyone will have several opportunities to comment further.

Most important of all is that as many people as possible express their opinion by completing and returning the Response Form by the deadline date of November 25th 2010. AND FINALLY A WORD FROM THE EDITOR!

I read with interest the police report on 'Operation Agrarian' particularly as I was one of the 225 vehicles stopped!

It was one of my first outings driving the car since my knee replacement, I couldn't imagine why I was being pulled over by the police and although I didn't think I had done anything wrong, was slightly anxious about their reasons. It seems I was pulled in because I was driving a 4 X 4 vehicle and along with lorries and vans they rate high on the list in the register of stolen vehicles. The police officers were most courteous and

after making their various enquiries and checks I was allowed to go on my way. Shame I lost any street cred I had gained being cool, calm and collected by driving over and flattening their cones as I left the car park!

Whilst the officer was radioing the relevant authority with my details and I was waiting being given a 'clean bill of health' I reflected on how different it was for Emily. In July she had her beloved vintage VW camper van stolen from Kew in London. 'Bertie' as he was affectionately known, was parked in a side street of a very salubrious area, when she returned she found Bertie gone and another car parked in his place.

She was devastated as Bertie was her pride and joy. She called the police to report the theft and was told she would be issued with a crime number within 72 hours. As it was out of office hours by then, I telephoned the DVLA the next day to report the theft hoping Bertie's registration number may be spotted by a number plate recognition camera. I was told they wouldn't take my details as they would be notified by the police within the 72 hour period. We were already resigned to the fact Bertie was either safely stashed away in a lock up being given a new identity or in a container and on his way to foreign parts. When the police finally rang Emily with a crime number, she asked if the surveillance camera film footage of the street could be looked at to see who had taken Bertie and when. The police officer told her that they didn't have enough resources to do this. Two weeks later they telephoned her to say the case had been closed due to insufficient evidence.

As I have got older, my soap box has got bigger and I have got more and more cynical with time. Car crime is low priority in the great scheme of things nowadays; there are far more devastatingly serious offences on the streets for the stretched resources of our police forces.

The police daily have to deal with murders, muggings, assaults and thefts of all sorts but what to them was a routine theft of an inanimate object and relegated to a closed and unsolved crime file, left a very frustrated and dispirited young person.

If the police resources were not so stretched and the surveillance film footage had been investigated, maybe, just maybe Emily's loss could have been closed and filed as a **solved** crime.

Thank you to those of you who have enquired after my health, concerned as I have not written in the last two months editions of the Newsletter.

My health was fine but I ran out of space in one and time in another. Nice to know you enjoy reading 'my bit'!
